# Three Raised Embroidery Stitches for the Anachronistic Embroiderer

There are five common, basic stitches used in embroidery. The most common and used across all cultures are the running stitch, chain stitch, split stitch, stem stitch, and the knot stitch. (Dupuis) These are known as Cross-cultural stitches. Knot stitches being one of those cross-cultural stitches evolve depending on the cultures use and needs, there are so far 20 different types of knot stitches known today all around the world. Second, to the knot stitches, chain stitch evolves into braid stitches the same way and the variety gets larger.

Some of the oldest stitches are the knot stitch and chain stitch, with extant garments and hangings being found all across China from the Warring States Period (247-221 BC) onward.

Raised Embroidery is Surface Embroidery, because:

Surface embroidery is any form of embroidery in which the pattern is worked by the use of decorative stitches and laid threads on top of the foundation fabric or canvas rather than through the fabric.

Surface embroidery stitches are also used as foundation stitches for the needle laces used in later period raised embroidery.

About the French knot and Bullion knot

A knot stitch belongs to a family of decorative **embroidery** stitches that create small three-dimensional knots on the surface of the textile. Knot stitches are made by wrapping an embroidery thread around a **needle** and stitching it down. The main knot stitches are the French knot and Pekin (China) knot.

Varying the number of wraps markedly changes the knot's appearance. Larger knot stitches like bullion, coral, and colonial knots (American Colonial Period) add an additional dimension to the embroidery.

The simple knot stitch is known by many names including French knot, French dot, knotted stitch, twisted knot stitch, wound stitch, Pekin knot, Chinese knot, knot stitch, seed stitch, Forbidden stitch, Forbidden knot, and blind stitch. (TRC Leiden2) The term French knot generally describes these stitches, although more than 20 different varieties of knot stitches have been identified throughout the world.



The little bag is thought to be a love or a wedding gift. It shows a couple in an unmistakably erotic encounter. The clothes are tied up for dancing and the young girl is holding the youth by the tip of his hood. In her other hand she is holding a wreath as a symbol of her virginity. The back of the bag is embroidered in equally delicate silk with a scene showing the arrival of the cavalier. The particularly refined finish and the charm of the depiction combined with the excellent preservation of the object make it one of the gems of the courtly love embroidery. 

## French knot Stitch Diagram and instructions

## Instructions:

Bring the needle up through the fabric at A. Twist the thread around the needle three times. Put the needle down through the fabric close to A pulling the thread tight (not too tightly). Pull the needle and extra thread through and there's your knot.





# **Bullion knot**

The Bullion stitch is a decorative technique that is worked by twisting a thread around a sewing needle several times before inserting the needle into the cloth. Short bullion stitches are sometimes called bullion knots.

Also known as bullion knot, coil stitch, grub knot, Porto Rico rose, post stitch or worm stitch. (TRC Leiden3), called a Bullion Knot due to the similarity to the coiled gold bullion used in gold embroidery.








#### *Instructions:*

Bring the needle up through the fabric at A for knot and make a backstitch to B at the length required; bring needle only partly out at the original point. Twist thread loosely around the top of the needle, 6 or 8 times, or enough to make the right length of the stitch. Hold carefully with the left thumb while pulling the needle through. Turn needle ready to insert at bottom of the stitch, pull the needle tight and pass the needle through to the back.





## Chain Stitches

The chain stitch is a versatile **embroidery** stitch used to define lines and borders that can also be effective as a filling stitch. Chain stitch has ancient origins and is an important part of many cultural needlework traditions, especially for patterns that appear to be drawn in a thread. Subtle shading can be achieved by filling in shapes with rows of chain stitch. Chain stitch is created by creating a line of loops that are secured to the top of a base fabric. The thread is brought up from the underside, a loop held in place with the thumb, and the next stitch drawn through the loop. Rather than pulling tight, the loops are left loose and built one after another. The underside of the chain stitch resembles the backstitch. There are many variations of the chain stitch, including open chain, double chain, feathered chain, and detached chain. Chain stitch has been utilized in many cultural works of Europe. (TRC Leiden) In Britain, it was used in Opus Anglicanum and in Germany Opus Teutonicum or Whitework. In China far, far to the East chain stitch was used to not only outline a design but fill it in as far back as 221BC. This stitch is almost as old as mankind's need to embellish its garments.






## Chain Stitch Instructions and Stitch Diagram

Whether one does the traditional or reverse chain stitch one thing can be said, from the back of the item embroidered, there is no difference between them.

## Instructions

Bring the needle out at A then down at B. The first loop comes up at C, loops through the first stitch and back down at C. Repeat along the line or as your design instructs.


